### **FMSSF adopts DCR's Park Watch Program**

Chief Ranger Curt Rudge, Director of the Department of Conservation and Recreation's (DCR) Park Watch program described how the program works to FMSSF at the November 18 meeting. By December, the Board voted unanimously to bring the program to MSSF.

Ranger Rudge explained that the program begins with him setting up a meeting with police chiefs in Plymouth and Carver. After that, FMSSF will help set up a community meeting where Ranger Rudge will explain the program to the public and conduct volunteer training for those interested in participating.

Park Watch volunteers report any illegal or suspicious activity to DCR Park Rangers or State Police. Illegal or suspicious behavior can include: vandalism, ground fires, illegal dumping, consumption of alcohol, collecting plants or animals, illegal motorized vehicles on trails, camping or park use after dusk. "As far as the reporting goes," said Ranger Rudge, "we direct people to utilize our Park Watch number (1-866-PK-WATCH) to report things and in turn our dispatchers pass the message along to the appropriate people or agency. Its a great program and your group is a perfect fit for it."

Volunteers work cooperatively with forest staff, park rangers, environmental and local police to recognize and report suspicious activity in and around park areas. They also provide information to park managers and local law enforcement agencies by being "eyes & ears" in the forest.

FMSSF Ken Winters has stepped forward to chair the Park Watch Subcommittee. Ken will help arrange the first pubic meeting. Meanwhile, report suspicious activity to the Forest staff at (508) 866-2526 or call the number PK Watch number above.

# "Friend's Trail" gets finishing Touches

**East Entrance Trail designer Peter McLaughlin** lead a work party of nine volunteers on December 14 along the newly finished Friend's Trail. Workers nailed up trail markers and then tested them to make sure the markers lead hikers in the right direction.

The new trail is part of a larger project undertaken by the friends group in 2008 to make the east entrance more appear more

natural and encourage recreation in the northeast corner of the forest.

Earlier in the year, Kevin Madley directed a native plant project, installing over 40 shrubs and trees in keeping with Pine Barrens habitat. DCR crews expanded the parking lot, removed a hazardous island, worked out drainage problems and moved two picnic tables to the site. Since the improvements, friends and staff have remarked on the increase in the numbers of cars parked at the entrance and that more people seem to be enjoying the paved bike trails that begin here. The new trail should attract even more users now that it is clearly marked.

The East Entrance Project still has a ways to go before friends call it done. Peter is working on a map of the new trail, which he hopes to make available at the trailhead, and Kevin plans to improve the plantings and the beds once winter is done and he can evaluate the survival rate of each type of plant. And there is always the maintenance!

## Massachusetts Forest and Park Friends Network Formed

On October 25, 2008, Friends of the Middlesex Fells joined other Massachusetts Friends groups in Worcester to found a new organization dedicated to better protect and enhance Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) parks and forests across the Commonwealth. The meeting capped a year's effort by an organizing team comprised of

capped a year's effort by an organizing team comprised of Friends groups leaders representing Robinson State Park, Upton State Forest, Myles Standish State Forest, the Middlesex Fells Reservation, and Douglas State Forest—to create the first ever statewide network of DCR park supporters.

The new organization is called the Massachusetts Forest and Park Friends Network and its website www.networkingfriends.net/index.html explains its purpose: "Effective stewardship of public forests and parks requires cooperation and the combined efforts of many individuals, organizations and state agencies. . . . By sharing information, helping one another, and working together on statewide issues of concern we can grow our membership and increase our potential to help protect our forests and parks, insuring that these lands will remain wonderful places to visit for generations."

Following introductory remarks by the organizing team, DCR Partnership Director Conrad Crawford, State Representative Anne Gobi, and forest and park supporters got to work in 2 workshops; one to discuss how to form and strengthen forest and park friends groups and the other focused on the threat of commercial logging in DCR forests and parks.

So far the Network, which includes 19 DCR Friends groups as well as many supporters of Friends groups, has been involved in issues such as reducing illegal off road vehicle use in DCR parks, helping Friends of the Blue Hills fight loss of part of their parkland to a commercial developer, and learning about the issue of clear cut logging in state forests and parks. A 'news' section and 'critical issues' page of the website helps keep park supporters informed.
